Planned before the coronavirus pandemic, Teens Talk Television kicked off right in the confusion of it during the summer of 2020, with the production of five episodes - Voting, Social Justice, Mental Health, Money, Life After High School - and two amazing interns, Madison Harris, now a graduate of Howard University, and Solange Muller, currently a senior at Temple University. We pivoted quickly from studio recording to Google Meet and made it work. Thanks to the continued support of Parks and Recreation, M-NCPPC, Teens Talk Television has expanded to Teens Talk Network (TTN) and includes Student Creatives, a forthcoming podcast, and much more.






